ABSTAINING FROM SIN: LEGALISM OR GRACE?

1 PETER 2:11–12



1ST PETER

LIVING IN LIGHT OF ETERNITY

Rom. 6:1, “What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound?”

Rom. 6:2, “Certainly not! How shall we who died to sin live any longer in it?”

Gal. 5:13, “For you, brethren, have been called to liberty; only do not use liberty as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another.”

What is “the flesh”?

- 1. The flesh of a living creature.**
- 2. Used to refer to the physical body.**
- 3. Used to refer to the material body in contrast to the immaterial nature.**
- 4. Used with reference to the weakness or sinfulness of man, the capacity to sin, the nature of sin, the sinful passions and affections.**

Fleshly and fleshy, *sarkikos*, that which pertains to the sin nature, the desires and lust patterns of the sin nature.

What is “the flesh”?

The Scripture uses the word “flesh” to describe the sinful capacity, the corruption which sin has brought, upon the human race and all of the desires, thoughts, actions, and trends which orient each of us away from God and His perfect righteousness.

Negatively: Abstain from fleshly lusts

Beloved = primarily beloved by God, not Paul, Peter, John, or James

Phil. 4:1, “Therefore, my beloved and longed-for brethren, my joy and crown, so stand fast in the Lord, beloved.”

James 1:16, “Do not be deceived, my beloved brethren.”

*** We need to transform our thinking, into understanding that God loves other believers because**

Acts 7:6, “But God spoke in this way: that his descendants would dwell in a foreign land, and that they would bring them into bondage and oppress them four hundred years.”
